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Raise money on your campus to use for urgent MV needs:

- Collect money for students to wear hats to school with logo "Hats off to stopping homelessness,"
- "Cut out homelessness" by charging a small fee for students to enter a Rock, Paper, Scissors tournament. Match them up and get the tournament started! The best two out of three wins, then the winners match up and play again. Keep going until only a few participants are left playing. Then, have a \$5 buy-in to get back into the game. The final winner gets a prize.
- Have a MOVIE NIGHT to fundraise in elementary schools. Organizing a viewing of an age-appropriate movie in your gym or cafeteria is a fun way to raise money for your school while involving students and their families.
- "Power of change" is a simple but effective fundraiser encouraging a fun competition. Just place one jar per class in a secure place. The students can then add their spare change to the jars until a set date. The class that manages to collect the most change gets a reward, maybe donated pizza.
- At Region 15 ESC, we are collecting food gift cards to donate to MV families.
- There are so many ways to successfully raise money and empower your students.
