Not only is parent and family engagement an important piece to what we do, it is actually one of the six components required as part of a <u>High Quality Pre-K Program</u>. <u>Bright by Text</u> is a resource you can share with parents that is super easy to use! They sign up via text to receive tips, milestone information, appropriate activities, and community events based on their child's age and zip code. They enter information for multiple children ages birth - 8, and there is also prenatal information for expectant



Important Assessment Information

ECDS opened for BOY data uploading on November 13th, so it's time to get started uploading! (**Kinder** teachers, remember that the BOY submission window *closes January 25th*, so all BOY data must be entered by that date.)

TEA strongly encourages MOY assessments, and - like BOY - should include <u>all 5 of the required domains</u>. TEA has begun reaching out to ESCs and districts if assessment data is missing and/or incomplete, so check to make sure all domains are complete!

Remember you also have the <u>Pre-K Interim Progress Report</u> to help you document growth between assessment windows and keep up with targeted, differentiated instruction.

DEVELOPMENTALLY APPROPRIATE PRACTICES

Letter Knowledge

Snowman Names

Cut out plenty of white circles so there are enough for every student to have one per letter in their name and one for the face. Have students write one letter per "snowball" to create their name. Have them stack the snowballs so that it spells their names top-tobottom. Glue to large piece of construction paper, providing room for students to add accessories such as a face, hat, arms, etc. *Whose snowman is tallest? Shortest? Why?*



Math

Pattern Block Snowmen

Decorate a snowman during small group/centers using a combination of **numeral and pattern block** dice. Create a large snowman outline. Students take turns rolling the numeral die and the pattern block die to see how many need to be added to the snowman. They can use the pattern blocks for eyes, nose, smile, buttons, etc. The key is to name the the numeral and the shape, find the correct

number of the right shape, and add them to the snowman.



Remember to use correct shape name of rhombus rather than diamond.



Writing

Snow Writing

One of the easiest and most fun ways to practice writing letters is using shaving cream on the tables! Squirt a little in front of each student, and encourage them to use proper strokes to write letters - both upper and lower case. Have them practice writing their names, friends' names, vocabulary words, etc. Practice drawing shapes and writing numerals, as well. The more they write, the more the snow "melts!"

FYI... If you don't want to put it on the tables, use individual trays. If you have students with sensory issues, place shaving

cream in a bag.



Discovery

Snow Sensory Bin

We've probably all seen Insta-Snow. We know it's fun to play with, but have you ever tried DIY snow? If not, give it a try and create a winter discovery bin for your students. There are variations of the recipe, but here are the 2 most common:


3 cups baking soda + 1/2 - 1 cup white conditioner

1 cup of baking soda: 1 cup of shaving cream









Sneezy the Snowman

B-R-R-R! AH-CHOO! Sneezy the Snowman is cold, cold, cold. To warm up, he drinks cocoa, sits in a hot tub, stands near a warm fire-and melts! But the children know just what to do to build him up again-and make him feel "just right". The repetitive text makes this a fun read aloud as children will love repeating, "Make me brand new!" each time Sneezy does something silly to make himself melt.




Snowballs

Even with the use of little text, this book lends itself to wonderful discussion about how the pictures were made through the art of collage using vibrant cut paper and textured objects, like buttons, fabric, and seeds. After reading, encourage students to create their own snow people using miscellaneous items from the classroom, brought from home, found during a walk around the school, etc. This is a perfect project for sparking imagination and creativity!











On a quiet snowy night, the lights go out, and the bright snowball moon outside illuminates everything. Two children meet up with some of their neighborhood friends to have fun in the snow sledding, building snow forts, and having snowball fights. They then go back inside to warm up by the fire with hot cocoa before going to sleep, dreaming of sleds and the next time they can have more snowy fun! With charming, retro illustrations and simple rhyming text, kids will love this warm winter picture book!
